#### Brethren Abroad: Lessons from a Semester in Roma



My experiences abroad have given me a larger perspective of what it means to be a brother of Kappa Kappa Psi. I'd like to share three realms of enlightenment: the broth-

erly connection to family, the universality of music, and the strength of our chapter's bonds.

**Family**: Brotherhood is rooted in the model of family ties. While in Italy, I have met about fifteen of my Italian family members. On the surface, we have very little in common: different careers, different interests; even different languages. These people haven't even heard from my family in 60 years! And yet, when we met there was an immediate feeling of connection with each other and of felicity in knowing that, despite all our differences, we were united in the bond of family. Considering our brotherhood, I believe that this sort of unity should be something we strive for with each

other: no matter how different or distant, we are still joined together and should celebrate that.

Music: I have had the opportunity to enjoy many musical events while here in Europe, but one concert in Rome particularly inspired me. The concert was An Evening with Tchaikovsky and *Prokofiev*, guest directed by the conductor of the Shanghai Orchestra. As I took in the

music, I was struck by the poetry of an American listening to an Italian orchestra performing Russian music, all conducted by a Chinese conductor. I have never seen

anything else that can bring such diverse cultures together so seamlessly; music truly is the greatest of the arts.

## SPRING 2010 RETREAT




to the retreat since the beginning of the MC process. I'm not sure if it was my love for sleepovers or the fact that I would be able to spend a weekend

I've been going to Walker Upper Elementary School for a year and a half now, giving one-on-one lessons and playing with the introductory band there. I absolutely love the experience for some very simple reasons. They're fun, they challenge me as a musician and a teacher, and I learn a lot about myself

in the process.

Giving lessons challenges me to speak clearly and correctly when I'm explaining music. Our idea of leadership, that getting people to do what you want because they want to, really applies here. For example, I want my student to learn what a sharp or flat is. It's clear to me what it is, but to this 5<sup>th</sup> grader, I'm speaking a different language. I have learned that teaching someone requires you to pick and choose each word carefully, and I've grown a lot through my mistakes and successes.

Going to Walker allows you to make a difference on a young musician's development. They look up to you as an older musician, even if they don't always show it. I hope that because we can go, and show them how cool band can be, they will want to keep playing music and succeeding in school. It is so rewarding to see a young musician understand the fundamentals of music for the first time, and for them to recognize how everything works. Seeing them connect with music gives me a chance to connect with music again.

Rachel's house for spring retreat, celebrating third degree, Discoveroo, chalking too, always lending helping hands!


