Originally founded on September 23, 1950, and active until 1962, the Beta Chi Chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi was re-founded at the University of Virginia on April 23, 2005. The original chapter supplied the first President and Secretary/Treasurer of the Northeast District in 1958 and hosted the first annual District Convention that same year. Today, Beta Chi provides support for the Cavalier Marching Band and other ensembles in the Charlottesville community. The oldest active chapter in the Southern Precinct, Beta Chi has welcomed over 250 well-qualified musicians into the Brotherhood of Kappa Kappa Psi.





Every member of the band who signed up to play the game would receive the name of a target they had to tag with a sock to stay in the game while having to avoid being tagged themselves. If they tagged their target they would receive a new target, and so on until there was one person standing. There were also daily immunities that participants could complete so that their assassin couldn't tag them.

Before continuing any further, I would like to take a moment to express my love and admiration of Allison Haszard, co-Sock Overlord extraordinaire who took on this responsibility with me and helped keep the game on track with her amazing immunity ideas, immunity emails, and other admin tasks. This would not have run nearly as well without her help and I'm very grateful she wanted to take this on with me.

The entire game lasted 40 days and would be difficult to recount in its entirety, so instead I'll share some superlatives from this year's iteration. Best immunity: Hands down the best immunity we chose was banana phones. Each sock warrior had to carry a banana around with them all day to be immune, but the kicker was that they also had to be holding it up to their ear like a phone or else the immunity wouldn't count. I received several snapchats and texts from my friends showing them with their banana phones throughout the day, and saw even more band members I didn't know personally with their banana phones when I walked to and from my classes. The last day was much different than the first—the problem then was that the first person to tag me was going to win sock wars but I didn't have any immunity and that day I was going to be out of my apartment around grounds all day. I spent the entire day looking over my shoulder for the two finalists, and our winner finally managed to find me that night at a band house. It was the only day this year I felt the stress of our sock warriors and the paranoia that comes with knowing that someone is hunting you down to tag you with a sock, and I have to say I wasn't a fan.

Best kill reports: The best emails we received to report sock kills came from first year Nathan Snow in the drumline, who attributes his storytelling prowess to being a theater kid in high school. I recommend asking him to regale you with tales of his sock wars exploits, or you could ask me or Allison for the emails. Spoiler: he fell just a few days short of the win.


